#### Aim

#### **Brief Description**

18 The department is responsible for prevention of the introduction and spread of animal and plant diseases, safeguard of animal welfare, regulation of drug use in livestock farms, provision of services to facilitate export of plants, animals and plant/animal by-products, prevention of rabies and enforcement of regulations pertaining to animal welfare and import requirements. The work involves:

- the prevention and control of rabies;
- the provision of quarantine services;
- the inspection of animals and plants imported into the territory;
- the inspection of farms where food animals are kept;
- the inspection of premises and establishments where animals are kept for exhibition or trading purposes; and

• the instigation of prosecution against offenders under relevant legislation.

**19** The technical services provided by the department include:

- advising on development projects affecting agriculture, countryside and fisheries, and assessing ex-gratia payments to primary producers arising therefrom;

## ANALYSIS OF FINANCIAL PROVISION

#### **Analysis of Financial and Staffing Provision**

#### Programme (1)

Provision for 2001–02 is \$17.1 million (13.3%) higher than the revised estimate for 2000–01. This is mainly due to increases in capital expenditure, salary increments for existing staff, full-year provision for filling of vacancies and posts created in 2000–01, partly offset by the deletion of four posts in 2001–02 under the Enhanced Productivity Programme and 13 time-limited posts upon completion of capital projects. In addition, another 22 posts have also been deleted in 2000–01 under the Enhanced Productivity Programme.

#### Programme (2)


Provision for 2001–02 is \$21.5 million (5.4%) higher than the revised estimate for 2000–01. This is mainly due to increases in capital expenditure, salary increments for existing staff, full-year provision for filling of vacancies and posts created in 2000–01 and the creation of five posts in 2001–02, including three posts for designating two marine parks around the sea areas of Soko Islands and Southwest Lantau and two posts for other projects, partly offset by the deletion of 23 posts in 2001–02 under the Enhanced Productivity Programme. In addition, another 18 posts have also been deleted in 2000–01 under the Enhanced Productivity Programme.

#### Programme (3)

Provision for 2001–02 is \$10.8 million (15.8%) higher than the revised estimate for 2000–01. This is mainly due to increases in capital expenditure and full-year provision for filling of vacancies, partly offset by deletion of 11 posts in 2001–02 under the Enhanced Productivity Programme. In addition, another 26 posts have also been deleted in 2000–01 under the Enhanced Productivity Programme.

#### Programme (4)

Provision for 2001–02 is \$6.2 million (4.5%) higher than the revised estimate for 2000–01. This is mainly due to salary increments for existing staff, full-year provision for filling of vacancies and posts created in 2000–01 and additional provision for improving food safety measures, partly offset by the deletion of one post in 2001–02 under the Enhanced Productivity Programme. In addition, another one post has also been deleted in 2000–01 under the Enhanced Productivity Programme.

#### **Details of Expenditure by Subhead**

The estimate of the amount required in 2001–02 for the salaries and expenses of the Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department is \$786,752,000. This represents an increase of \$55,556,000 over the revised estimate for 2000–01 and of \$70,961,000 over actual expenditure in 1999–2000.

#### **Recurrent Account**

**2** Provision of \$688,344,000 under *Subhead 000 Operational expenses* is for the salaries and allowances of staff of the Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department and its other operating expenses. Management and control of the department's operational expenses takes the form of a one-line vote. The controlling officer is given flexibility in the virement of funds within the subhead to facilitate the achievement of greater efficiency and enhanced productivity.

**3** As a vote-funded department, the department is subject to establishment control. The establishment at 31 March 2001 will be 2 203 permanent posts. It is expected that a net 47 posts will be deleted in 2001–02. Subject to certain conditions, the controlling officer may under delegated powers create or delete non-directorate posts during 2001-02, but the notional annual mid-point salary value of all such posts must not exceed \$449,834,000 which will be reduced to \$448,346,000 upon deletion of eight posts in the course of the year.

**5** Subject to the cash-limited ceiling of \$688,344,000 which will not be increased in the course of the year except for increases to the personal emoluments portion in line with the civil service pay adjustment, the controlling officer may deploy funds freely to meet requirements under each of the various expenditure components. The Administration will provide to Finance Committee quarterly financial reports showing actual spending and any redeployment of funds within *Subhead 000 Operational expenses* based on the above analysis.

**6** Provision of \$1,200,000 under *Subhead 609 Minor irrigation works in the New Territories (block vote)* is for a programme to provide irrigation works to assist agricultural development in the New Territories up to a limit of \$700,000 for each project.

7 Provision of \$9,200,000 under Subhead 610 Minor recreational facilities and roadworks in country parks (block vote) is for minor works such as fire lookouts, public toilets, shelters and roads up to a limit of \$500,000 for each project, and for building materials for recreational facilities such as barbecue pits, information boards, shelters and outdoor furniture.

**8** Provision of \$9,174,000 under *Subhead 661 Minor plant, vehicles and equipment (block vote)* represents an increase of \$5,814,000 (173.0%) over the revised estimate for 2000–01. This is mainly due to increased requirement for equipment.

### Other Non-Recurrent

**9** Provision of \$6,470,000 under *Subhead* 844 *Minor conservation projects and studies (block vote)* is for conducting conservation, education and management projects and studies up to a limit of \$2,000,000 each, particularly those in relation to the Ramsar sites at Mai Po and Inner Deep Bay. The increase of \$2,150,000 (49.8%) over the revised estimate for 2000–01 is due to increased requirement for marine conservation.
