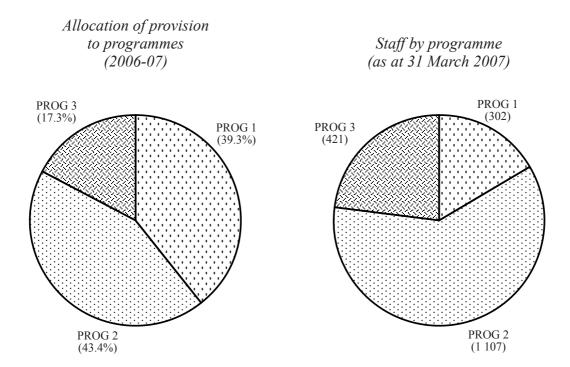

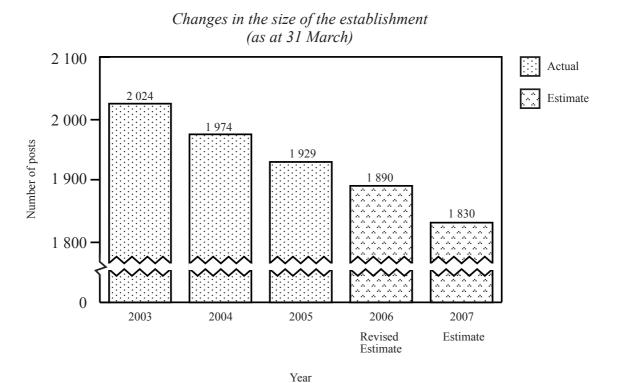

Provision for 2006–07 is \$4.6 million (2.9%) higher than the revised estimate for 2005–06. This is mainly due to increase in operating expenses, partly offset by decrease in non-recurrent and capital expenditure.

- **6** Provision of \$8,644,000 under *Subhead 610 Minor recreational facilities and roadworks in country parks (block vote)* is for minor works such as fire lookouts, public toilets, shelters and roads up to a limit of \$500,000 for each project, and for building materials for recreational facilities such as barbecue pits, information boards, shelters and outdoor furniture.
- 7 Provision of \$2,563,000 under *Subhead 661 Minor plant, vehicles and equipment (block vote)* represents a decrease of \$1,304,000 (33.7%) against the revised estimate for 2005–06. The decrease is mainly due to reduction in requirement for replacement of aging fire services equipment and air-conditioning systems.
