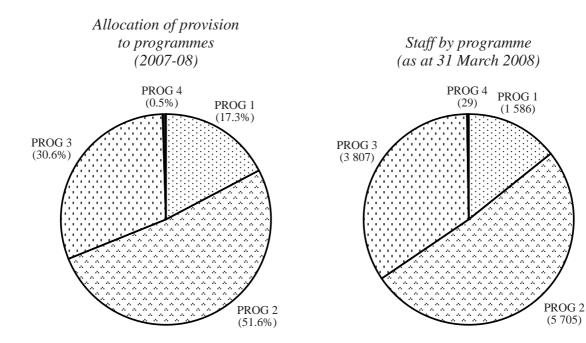

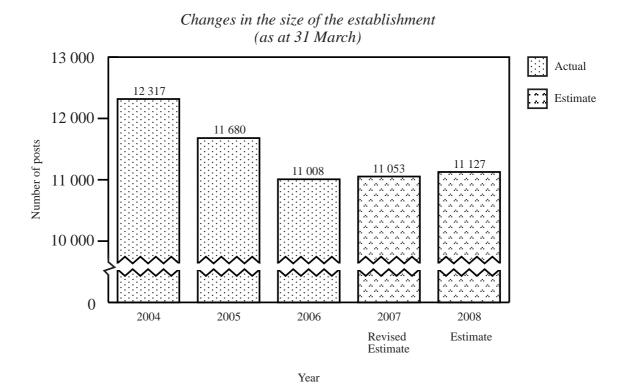
#### Programme (3)

#### **Details of Expenditure by Subhead**

The estimate of the amount required in 2007–08 for the salaries and expenses of the Food and Environmental Hygiene Department is \$4,077,004,000. This represents an increase of \$293,601,000 over the revised estimate for 2006–07 and of \$426,709,000 over actual expenditure in 2005–06.

- **2** Provision of \$4,042,374,000 under *Subhead 000 Operational expenses* is for the salaries, allowances and other operating expenses of the Food and Environmental Hygiene Department. The increase of \$322,609,000 (8.7%) over the revised estimate for 2006–07 is mainly due to increased provision for enhancing food safety and public health efforts and additional funding requirement for cleansing services.
- 3 The establishment as at 31 March 2007 will be 11 053 permanent posts. It is expected that there will be a net creation of 74 permanent posts in 2007–08. Subject to certain conditions, the controlling officer may under delegated power create or delete non-directorate posts during 2007–08, but the notional annual mid-point salary value of all such posts must not exceed \$2,080,951,000.
