#### **Programme**

##### **Student Assistance Scheme**

#### **Aim**

**2** The aim is to administer efficiently and cost-effectively various student financial assistance schemes, scholarships and merit award schemes.

#### **Brief Description**

**3** The Agency provides publicly-funded financial assistance in the form of grants and loans to students of different levels and administers privately-donated and publicly-funded scholarship schemes. The scholarships, merit awards and related schemes include the Sir Edward Youde Memorial Fund Scholarships and some 170 scholarships under the Education Scholarships Fund. Financial assistance mainly takes the form of:

- means-tested grants and loans# under the Tertiary Student Finance Scheme – Publicly-funded Programmes (formerly named as Local Student Finance Scheme) for eligible full-time students of publicly-funded institutions, i.e. University Grants Committee - funded institutions, the Hong Kong Institute of Vocational Education of the Vocational Training Council, the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts and the Dental Technology Course of the Prince Philip Dental Hospital;
- means-tested grants covering tuition fees and academic expenses under the Financial Assistance Scheme for Post-secondary Students for eligible full-time students aged 25 or below pursuing accredited, self-financing post-secondary education programmes;
- non-means tested loans# for eligible students of publicly-funded institutions, and eligible students pursuing accredited post-secondary programmes, courses offered by the Hong Kong Shue Yan University and the Open University of Hong Kong, and continuing and professional education courses provided in Hong Kong by registered schools, non-local universities and recognised training bodies;
- allowances under the Student Travel Subsidy Scheme for needy students who are receiving formal primary or secondary education or attending a full-time day course up to first degree, provided that these students are living beyond ten minutes' walking distance from their schools and have passed the means test;
- fee remission under the Senior Secondary Fee Remission Scheme§ for needy senior secondary students (Secondary 4-7) in public sector schools and the Examination Fee Remission Scheme for needy Secondary 5 and Secondary 7 students taking public examinations conducted by the Hong Kong Examinations and Assessment Authority;
- means-tested grants under the School Textbook Assistance Scheme for students in public sector schools and local private schools under the Direct Subsidy Scheme;
- fee remission under the Kindergarten and Child Care Centre Fee Remission Scheme for needy children attending kindergartens and child care centres;

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- tuition fee reimbursement under the Continuing Education Fund for eligible persons pursuing continuing education and training in specified sectors;
- tuition fee reimbursement under the Project Yi Jin¶ for eligible students completing modules under Project Yi Jin; and
- tuition fee reimbursement under the Financial Assistance Scheme for Designated Evening Adult Education Courses for eligible students attending designated evening senior secondary courses.

# Loans disbursed under these schemes are provided under the Loan Fund. Details are provided in Volume II.  
 § The amount of fee remission is not shown as an expenditure item under Head 173. In the case of aided schools, the cost of fee remission is reflected as increased subvention for aided schools under Head 156—Government Secretariat: Education Bureau *Subhead 000 Operational expenses* as a result of the schools receiving less in school fee receipts. In the case of government schools, fee remission is expressed as revenue forgone by the Government. Starting from the 2008/09 academic year, all students in public sector schools will be provided with free senior secondary education and the Senior Secondary Fee Remission Scheme is no longer required.  
 ¶ The amount of fee reimbursement is not shown as an expenditure item under Head 173. The expenditure is funded under Head 156—Government Secretariat: Education Bureau *Subhead 700 General non-recurrent Item 027 Project Yi Jin*.

4 The Agency is responsible for assessing the eligibility of applicants under the Pre-primary Education Voucher Scheme from the 2007/08 academic year onwards. Actual redemption of pre-primary education vouchers is not shown as an expenditure item under Head 173. The expenditure is funded under Head 156—Government Secretariat: Education Bureau *Subhead 000 Operational expenses*.

- α In the 2005/2006 academic year, the Agency implemented the expansion of the former Kindergarten Fee Remission Scheme (which is renamed as Kindergarten and Child Care Centre Fee Remission Scheme (KCFRS)) to cover all eligible children receiving pre-primary services (including those originally covered by the Child Care Centre Fee Assistance Scheme (CCCFAS) of the Social Welfare Department) upon harmonisation of pre-primary services. The indicators above have not included residual cases of existing recipients under the CCCFAS who are allowed to opt to continue receiving assistance based on the formula of the existing CCCFAS (subject to their meeting the eligibility criteria of the existing CCCFAS in a continuous manner). Such cases are paid out of Head 173 but processed by the Social Welfare Department. Starting from the 2007/08 academic year, the Pre-primary Education Voucher Scheme (PEVS) has been introduced to provide direct subsidy to parents in the form of vouchers to meet towards school fees for their children attending eligible kindergartens. The KCFRS has been realigned after the introduction of the PEVS such that fee remission will only be granted to needy children after deduction of the voucher value dedicated towards fee subsidy under the PEVS. This transitional arrangement will cease in the 2011/12 academic year when the voucher value dedicated towards fee subsidy will be increased to the fee remission ceiling of the KCFRS for half-day classes. Eligibility of the KCFRS will then be confined to needy children attending whole-day kindergarten classes, day crèches or day nurseries with established social needs.
- Ω Most of the funds disbursed are under the control of the donors or their trustees.
- ^ The Continuing Education Fund is open to applications throughout the year. The figures shown here relate to financial rather than academic years.
- Δ Starting from the 2008/09 academic year, all students in public sector schools will be provided with free senior secondary education and the Senior Secondary Fee Remission Scheme is no longer required.
- @ Tuition fees for Project Yi Jin and the Financial Assistance Scheme for Designated Evening Adult Education Courses are disbursed on a reimbursement basis.
- β New indicator as from the 2007–08 Estimates. It is assumed that 90 per cent of the children in the relevant age cohorts for attending kindergarten classes will apply for the PEVS. Face value of the voucher in the 2007/08 academic year is \$13,000 per student per annum, which will increase to \$14,000 per student per annum in the 2008/09 academic year.
- ▽ Holders of the Certificate of Eligibility of the PEVS need not re-apply for the PEVS within the specific validity period. Only first-time applicants are required to submit applications for the PEVS. The indicators above have only included the number of applications and voucher value involved for first-time applicants.

- 6 In the 2006/07 academic year, around 949 000 applications were received for processing under the various student financial assistance schemes. The Agency was generally able to process all applications with complete information within the time frame as pledged.

### ***Matters Requiring Special Attention in 2008–09***


- 7 The PEVS was extended to cover children on the Comprehensive Social Security Assistance (CSSA) Scheme attending eligible kindergartens by phases starting from the 2007/08 academic year. The Agency will continue to process the relevant applications in the 2008/09 academic year. Where the fee subsidy under the PEVS is not adequate to cover the tuition fee of the kindergarten, additional assistance will be provided under the KCFRS.

**Analysis of Financial and Staffing Provision**

Provision for 2008–09 is \$185.9 million (5.4%) higher than the revised estimate for 2007–08. This is mainly due to an expected increase in the demand for financial assistance under the Financial Assistance Scheme for Post-secondary Students arising from ongoing expansion of post-secondary education opportunities, an anticipated increase in payments for reimbursement of course fees under the Continuing Education Fund arising from the extension of the validity period for each successful applicant from two years to four years, and increased provision for temporary staff to meet operational needs, partly offset by the reduction in payments under the Kindergarten and Child Care Centre Fee Remission Scheme with the introduction of the Pre-primary Education Voucher Scheme.

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### **Details of Expenditure by Subhead**

The estimate of the amount required in 2008–09 for the salaries and expenses of the Student Financial Assistance Agency is \$3,649,222,000. This represents an increase of \$185,909,000 over the revised estimate for 2007–08 and of \$61,684,000 over actual expenditure in 2006–07.

#### *Operating Account*

##### **Recurrent**

**2** Provision of \$238,744,000 under *Subhead 000 Operational expenses* is for the salaries, allowances and other operating expenses of the Student Financial Assistance Agency. The increase of \$60,518,000 (34.0%) over the revised estimate for 2007–08 is mainly due to the full-year effect of salaries for the civil service posts created in 2007–08, the provision of temporary staff to implement the extension of the PEVS to cover children on the CSSA Scheme, and to cater for an expected increase in the demand for student financial assistance under the Financial Assistance Scheme for Post-secondary Students, and the enhancement of control measures under various student financial assistance schemes.

**3** The establishment as at 31 March 2008 will be 279 permanent posts. No net change in establishment is expected in 2008–09. Subject to certain conditions, the controlling officer may under delegated power create or delete non-directorate posts during 2008–09, but the notional annual mid-point salary value of all such posts must not exceed \$85,950,000.
