Provision for 2009–10 is \$38.1 million (4.9%) higher than the revised estimate for 2008–09. This is mainly due to additional provision for enhancing food safety and public health efforts. There will be a net increase of 12 posts in 2009–10.

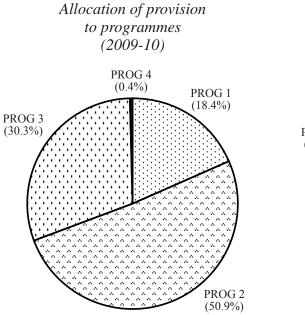
Provision for 2009–10 is \$87.7 million (3.7%) lower than the revised estimate for 2008–09. This is mainly due to the completion of the ex-gratia payment made to live poultry retailers of fresh provision shops under the buyout package in 2008–09, partly offset by increased operating expenses for cleansing services. There will be a net decrease of 11 posts in 2009–10.

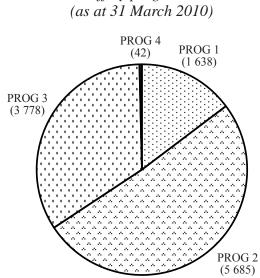

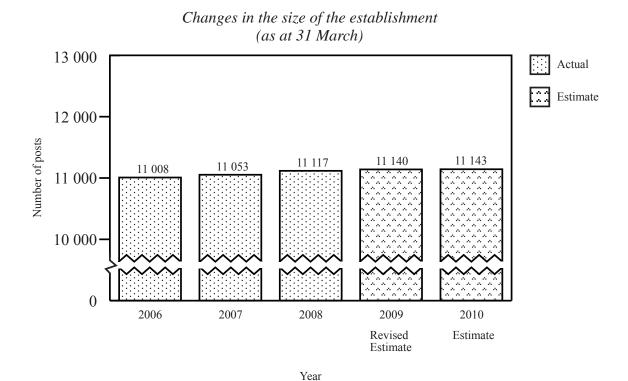
