



Details of Expenditure by Subhead

The estimate of the amount required in 2011–12 for the salaries and expenses of the Treasury Branch is \$332,979,000. This represents a decrease of \$318,648,000 against the revised estimate for 2010–11 and of \$4,288,821,000 against actual expenditure in 2009–10. The decrease is due to the reduced cash flow requirement for the electricity charge subsidy scheme.
