Aim

2 The Aim is to administer efficiently and cost-effectively student financial assistance schemes, scholarships and merit award schemes.

Brief Description

- 3 The Agency provides publicly funded financial assistance in the form of grants and loans to students of different levels and administers privately donated and publicly funded scholarship schemes. The scholarships, merit awards and related schemes include the Sir Edward Youde Memorial Fund Scholarships, and some 170 scholarships under the Education Scholarship Fund. Financial assistance mainly takes the form of:
 - grants and loans† under the Local Student Finance Scheme for eligible students attending degree or sub-degree courses at publicly-funded institutions, i.e. University Grants Committee (UGC) funded institutions, the Hong Kong Institute of Vocational Education (HKIVE) of the Vocational Training Council (VTC), the Dental Technology Course at the Prince Philip Dental Hospital (PPDH), and the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts (HKAPA);
 - grants and loans† under the Student Finance Assistance Scheme for students of the Hong Kong Shue Yan College (HKSYC);
 - loans† under the Non-means Tested Loan Scheme for eligible full-time and part-time students of publicly-funded institutions, the Open University of Hong Kong (OUHK), and the HKSYC;
 - allowances under the Travel Subsidy Schemes for needy primary students aged below 12 who attend public sector schools outside their residing Primary One Admission Net and are living beyond ten minutes walking distance from their schools, and for students aged 12 and above who have not completed their first degree;
 - fee remission under the Senior Secondary Fee Remission Scheme
 § for senior secondary students (Secondary 4 in public sector schools;
 - grants under the School Textbook Assistance Scheme for students in public sector schools and local private schools under the Direct Subsidy Scheme; and
 - fee remission under the Kindergarten Fee Remission Scheme for kindergarten pupils.

5 In the 1998/99 academic year, the Agency implemented new initiatives to assist needy students, including the provision of textbook and stationery grants to senior secondary students and travel subsidies for primary pupils aged below 12. Despite a significant increase in applications, particularly from the pre-primary, primary and secondary school sectors as a result of the economic downturn, the Agency was generally able to complete the processing of all applications with complete information within the time-frame as pledged. To encourage continuing and professional learning, the scope of the newly implemented Non-means Tested Loan Scheme was also widened to cover OUHK students, full-time students of HKSYC and part-time students pursuing publicly-fund programmes offered by publicly-funded institutions. In the 1999/2000 academic year, the eligibility criteria for full rate of financial assistance under the Senior Secondary Fee Remission, Examination Fee Remission, School Textbook Assistance and Kindergarten Fee Remission Schemes was relaxed and has benefitted an additional 22 274 students as at 31 December 1999. The Agency also embarked on a student expenditure survey covering full-time students in the publicly-funded higher education institutions. This 12-month survey is intended to provide up-to-date base figures for determining the appropriate level of assistance under the Local Student Finance Scheme.

Matters Requiring Special Attention in 2000


- **6** During 2000–01, the Agency will:
- develop a computer system to support the operation of the extended Non-means Tested Loan Scheme;
- enhance the computer system supporting the Local Student Finance Scheme with a view to streamlining loan administration and repayment processes;
- implement the recommendations approved by the Finance Committee on 12.11.1999 to further extend the scope of the Non-means Tested Loan Scheme. Upon extension, the scheme will also cover students of self-financing, local award-bearing programmes offered by publicly-funded institutions, part-time students of local award-bearing programmes of the HKSYC and the students taking publicly-funded programmes at Technician level in the HKIVE of the VTC;
- review the effectiveness and efficiency of the Non-means Tested Loan Scheme in the light of operational experience;
- review the appropriate level of assistance under the Local Student Finance Scheme in the light of the findings of the student expenditure survey; and
- step up publicity and authentication measures to enhance the integrity of the student assistance schemes.

Analysis of Financial and Staffing Provision

Provision for 2000–01 is \$99.8 million (5.0%) higher than the revised estimate for 1999 2000. This is mainly due to estimated higher levels of average assistance and an expected increase in the number of successful applications under various student assistance schemes arising from a projected increase in the student population. The increase also reflects the creation of 24 posts in 2000 01 mainly to step up publicity and authentication measures to enhance the integrity of the student assistance schemes.

Details of Expenditure by Subhead

The estimate of the amount required in 2000 01 for the salaries and expenses of the Student Financial Assistance Agency is \$2,105,807,000. This represents an increase of \$99,830,000 over the revised estimate for 1999 \$230,853,000 on actual expenditure in 1998

Recurrent Account

Personal Emoluments

- 2 Provision of \$67,932,000 for personal emoluments represents an increase of \$3,904,000 over the revised estimate for 1999–2000 and takes into account the provision for posts to be created in 2000 01 and full-year provision for posts
- **3** The establishment at 31 March 2000 will be 206 permanent posts. It is expected that 24 additional posts will be created in 2000–01.
- **4** Subject to certain conditions, the controlling officer may, under delegated powers create or delete non-directorate posts during 2000–01, but the notional annual mid-point salary value of all such posts must not exceed \$62,389,000.
 - 5 Provision of \$2,395,000 under Subhead 002 Allowances is for standard allowances.

Departmental Expenses

6 Provision of \$19,912,000 under *Subhead 149 General departmental expenses* represents an increase of \$1,935,000 (10.8%) over the revised estimate for 1999 2000. This is mainly due to the implementation of the computer system for administering the Non-means Tested Loan Scheme (NLS) and the office automation programme and for expansion of the ambit of the Non-means Tested Loan Scheme to cover more eligible students.

Other Charges

- 7 Provision of \$9,712,000 under *Subhead 151 Remission of examination fees* is to provide financial assistance to full school fee remission recipients taking public examinations conducted by the Hong Kong Examinations Authority. The amount remitted varies with the type of examination and the number of subjects taken.
- **8** Provision of \$14,425,000 under *Subhead 152 Scholarships, bursaries and maintenance grants* is for the payment of inducement grants to mature students of the one-year full-time technical teachers—course in the Hong Kong Institute of Education, maintenance grants to students on Hong Kong Advanced Level courses, grants to students at Shue Yan College under the Student Finance Assistance Scheme (SFAS), scholarships to pupils at the Sir Ellis Kadoorie School and merit awards to pupils in private schools. The increase of \$1,557,000 (12.1%) over the revised estimate for 1999 2000 is mainly due to an expected increase in the number of successful applications under the various schemes.
- **9** Provision of \$277,301,000 under *Subhead 153 Textbooks and stationery grants* is for the payment of grants to eligible pupils in public sector primary and secondary schools, and local private schools under the Direct Subsidy Scheme to purchase essential textbooks and stationery. The increase of \$8,109,000 (3.0%) over the revised estimate for 1999–2000 is mainly due to an expected increase in the number of successful applicants arising from a projected increase in the student population.
- 10 Provision of \$25,684,000 under *Subhead 155 Travel subsidy for primary school pupils* is for the payment of travel allowance to needy public sector primary school pupils aged below 12 who attend schools outside their residing Primary One Admission Net and who live beyond ten minutes walking distance from their schools. The increase of \$1,475,000 (6.1%) over the revised estimate for 1999 2000 is mainly due to an expected increase in the number of successful applications.
- 11 Provision of \$400,758,000 under *Subhead 156 Kindergartens-fee assistance* is for fee assistance to needy children attending kindergartens. Eligibility is dependent upon family size and income. The increase of \$37,203,000 (10.2%) over the revised estimate for 1999 2000 is mainly due to an expected increase in the number of successful applications and estimated higher levels of assistance.
- 12 Provision of \$991,785,000 under Subhead 274 Student finance-grants is for the payment of grants to students under the Local Student Finance Scheme (LSFS) which provides financial assistance to eligible students attending degree or sub-degree courses at the eight UGC-funded institutions, the Hong Kong Institute of Vocational Education of the Vocational Training Council, the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts and the Dental Technology Course at the Prince Philip Dental Hospital. The increase of \$44,997,000 (4.8%) over the revised estimate for 1999 mainly due to an expected increase in the number of successful applicants arising from a projected increase in the student population and estimated higher levels of assistance.
- 13 Provision of \$296,966,000 under *Subhead 275 Student travel scheme* is for the payment of travel allowance to full-time students aged 12 or above who have not yet completed their first degree and who live beyond walking distance from their places of study.
