

# Programme (1)



# **Details of Expenditure by Subhead**

The estimate of the amount required in 2016–17 for the salaries and expenses of the Innovation and Technology Bureau (ITB) is \$43,379,000. This represents an increase of \$30,743,000 over the revised estimate for 2015–16.

# Operating Account

### Recurrent

- 2 Provision of \$43,379,000 under *Subhead 000 Operational expenses* is for the salaries, allowances and other operating expenses of ITB. It represents an increase of \$30,743,000 (243.3%) over the revised estimate for 2015–16 which covers expenditure for only five months as compared with the full-year provision for 2016–17.
- 3 The establishment as at 31 March 2016 will be 31 posts. It is expected that there will be an increase of 12 posts in 2016–17. Subject to certain conditions, the controlling officer may under delegated power create or delete non-directorate posts during 2016–17, but the notional annual mid-point salary value of all such posts must not exceed \$21,312,000.
