Analysis of Financial and Staffing Provision

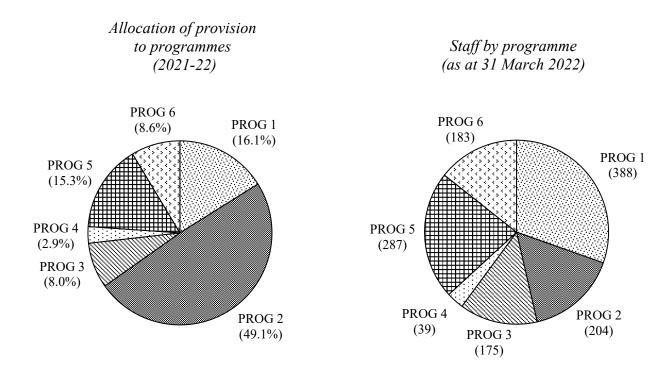

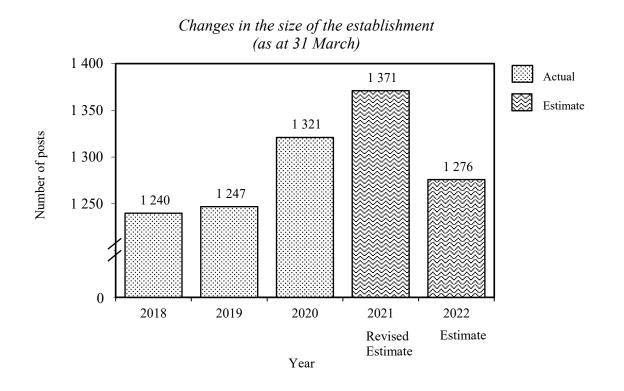

The estimate of the amount required in 2021–22 for the salaries and expenses of the Census and Statistics Department is \$1,254,862,000. This represents an increase of \$406,805,000 over the revised estimate for 2020–21 and \$501,578,000 over the actual expenditure in 2019–20.
