#### Analysis of Financial and Staffing Provision

#### Programme (1)

Provision for 2021–22 is \$80.4 million (5.5%) higher than the revised estimate for 2020–21. This is mainly due to increased operating expenses for enhancing the effectiveness in food safety management and food import control, stepping up rodent and mosquito prevention and control, and enhancing other public health services. There will be a net decrease of one post.

# **Programme (2)**

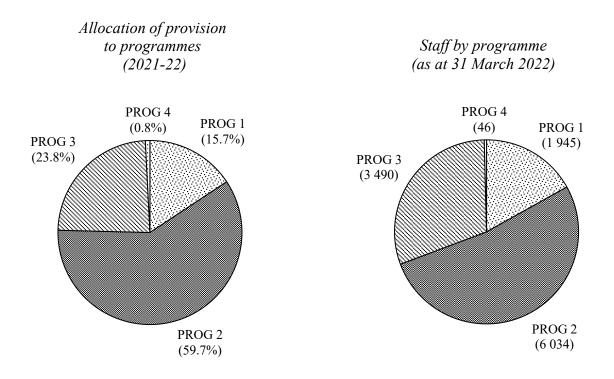
Provision for 2021-22 is \$231.0 million (4.1%) higher than the revised estimate for 2020-21. This is mainly due to increased operating expenses for keeping Hong Kong clean and enhancing other environmental hygiene services. There will be a net decrease of one post.

# Programme (3)

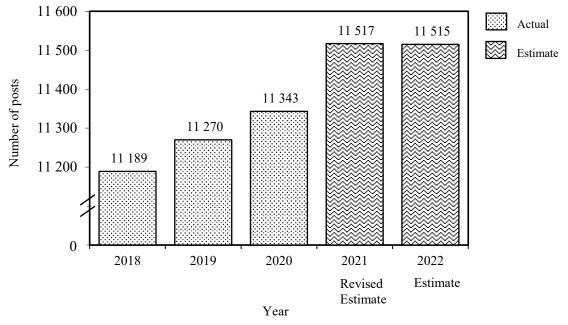
